



Lincoln Park Zoo Fact Sheet

Lincoln Park Zoo is a world class zoological institution located in Chicago's historic Lincoln Park neighborhood. Founded in 1868, the zoo is rich with architectural treasures, gardens and award-winning, progressively-designed animal habitats. A conservation haven nestled in the heart of Chicago, the zoo operates one of the country's largest zoo-based conservation and science programs and nationally-lauded educational programs. Committed to saving species locally and globally the zoo employs highly specialized experts in veterinary medicine, ecology, cognitive and behavioral research, endocrinology, epidemiology and population biology. The not-for-profit Lincoln Park Zoo attracts an estimated 3 million visitors per year and is one of America's last remaining free admission zoos.

- ANIMALS:** Home to more than 1,100 mammals, birds, reptiles and amphibians; thousands of fish & insects; the zoo collection represents approximately 200 different species of animals – many of which are rare and endangered.

- FUNDING & GOVERNANCE:** Lincoln Park Zoo is a non-profit institution managed by The Lincoln Park Zoological Society. The annual operating budget is approximately \$21 million. One quarter of the budget is funded by the Chicago Park District. The remainder is raised through donations from individuals, corporations and foundations and fundraising efforts of the Women's Board and Auxiliary Board, and revenues from programs, memberships, facility rentals, corporate sponsorship, gift shops and eateries.

IMPACT:**

Cultural institutions including museums, zoos, aquariums and botanic gardens are the top reason tourists visit Illinois, contributing an estimated \$1.1 billion in revenue to the state.

AWARD-WINNING

ZOO:

The zoo's Nature Boardwalk at Lincoln Park Zoo has received numerous significant awards for its positive environmental impact as well as architectural design. The Regenstein African Journey and Regenstein Center for African Apes have both been honored with the Association of Zoos and Aquariums' *Exhibit of the Year* awards. Additionally, the zoo has received numerous awards for excellence in international conservation, educational programming, architecture, landscape, accessibility, preservation, museum service and environmental improvement.

NEW ARRIVALS:

Lincoln Park Zoo babies were booming in 2012, especially at Regenstein Center for African Apes. For the first time since 2004, there are two western lowland gorilla youngsters living in the same troop. Not only does this provide a wonderful viewing opportunity for visitors, but it is great for the gorillas' wellbeing. The young gorillas will be able to learn valuable developmental and social skills from each other, while the adult females of the troop will all benefit from witnessing and taking part in maternal care.

URBAN OASIS:

Nature Boardwalk at Lincoln Park Zoo opened in June 2010. Visitors immerse themselves in a lush, newly naturalized ecosystem in the heart of the city. This completely transformed oasis of native trees, prairie and wetland plants provides a haven for wildlife and offers unique opportunities for visitors to connect with nature.

Rare migratory birds, such as the black-crowned night heron, can often be spotted nesting from spring to fall, while turtles sun themselves and dragonflies skim the water. This newly restored habitat attracts many more spectacular wildlife sightings than ever before.

**CONSERVATION
SCIENCE:**

Lincoln Park Zoo is home to one of the nation's largest zoo-based conservation and science programs. It is dedicated to sound science and innovative research aimed at improving animal management and wildlife conservation. Zoo scientists combine expertise in a

range of disciplines to identify threats to zoo and wild populations and develop strategies to ensure their continued existence. The zoo's research and conservation efforts focus on programs in small population biology, applied animal behavior, conservation of wild populations, epidemiology, endocrinology, cognition and learning, veterinary medicine, animal welfare, and urban wildlife ecology. These efforts are conducted on zoo grounds, locally in the Chicagoland and Midwest region, nationally, and internationally.

These disciplines are organized into five scientific centers of excellence, each with its own dedicated research staff, support staff and funding. These include the Population Management Center (PMC), Lester E. Fisher Center for the Study and Conservation of Apes, Alexander Center for Applied Population Biology, Davee Center for Epidemiology and Endocrinology, and the Urban Wildlife Institute.

Research Internship program: The zoo's Research Internship program provides unique opportunities for undergraduates and recent graduates to gain research experience on exotic species in a zoo setting. The zoo is committed to training young scientists to conduct independent research projects that are relevant to the management and conservation of zoo and wild populations. Several staff scientists hold faculty and adjunct positions at the University of Illinois and the University of Chicago where they supervise graduate students and post-doctoral fellows. In addition, the zoo can provide a great "field site" for graduate research projects.

GREEN SCENE: Lincoln Park Zoo is one of Chicago's premier green institutions and has been awarded "Green Museum" certification by the city's Department of the Environment.

Several accomplishments to date include the installation of seven green roofs, solar panels, energy efficient lighting, sustainable transportation for employees and increased recycling opportunities for everything from paper, plastic and aluminum to cell phones, toner and batteries. The zoo's latest environmental initiative is the Nature Boardwalk which features a half-mile boardwalk made from recycled materials. The newly engineered pond saves an estimated 10 million gallons of water per year and has been awarded several environmental awards. The zoo also features Café at Wild Things! – a seasonal café offering all organic or local foods and sustainable servingware such as recyclable cups and compostable flatware. Every element of the café was conscientiously chosen for its environmental credentials. It is a Certified Green Restaurant ® awarded by the Green Restaurant Association.

**EDUCATION
PROGRAMS:**

Lincoln Park Zoo's Education Department offers year-round programs and opportunities for children, teens, adults, families, teachers and school groups to learn and connect with wildlife. Daily, engaging and hands-on educational experiences for visiting school groups and families, professional development for teachers, summer camp programs for kids, and internships for teens are just a few of the dynamic educational programs here at the zoo.

FEATURES:

LPZOO Children's Train is a kid-friendly locomotive. Open seasonally. Suggested ages 3-12 years old. Tickets are \$2.50.

The AT&T Endangered Species Carousel features 48 artisan-crafted wooden animals and two chariots and can accommodate up to 50 riders. The menagerie is made up of rare and endangered animals, many of which are represented in Lincoln Park Zoo's collection. Wheelchair accessible. Open seasonally. \$2.75/ride.

Hurricane Simulator allows visitors of all ages a chance to experience a category 1 hurricane with a 78mph wind force. Cost: \$2.00.

There are plenty of opportunities to make zoo memories at kiosks featuring **face painting, tattoos, and original caricatures.**

STORES:

Visitors should not miss the seasonal **Wild Gifts** retail kiosk, which features polar bears, animals from the zoo's Regenstein African Journey exhibit, and convenient sundry items, and is located at the north end of the zoo near the polar bear exhibit.
